The NEW Adult Social History Templates

Earlier this month, we updated the Social History for our patients 18 and older, reducing the number of questions by nearly 2/3. The purpose was to make the Intake (where these questions are asked) more manageable while maintaining clinically relevant information.


The NEW Social History contains the following questions:

- Are you currently employed? If so, What is your occupation?
- What is your relationship status?
- For patients aged 13-24: Are you sexually active?
- Do you smoke tobacco? (if yes, questions to calculate pack-years)
- Do you use other forms of tobacco or nicotine?
- Do you use recreational drugs?
- Have you had any military service?

For patients who already have information in their Social History, Athena will continue to present it. In order to keep our Social History current, we're asking clinical staff to remove the old data.

For a patient with THIS information:

Education and Occupation



Choosing the <Select> under the 'Master's' drop down, and removing the text under 'what is your occupation' will remove those questions from the Social History.

For patients with THIS type of information there's some tricky tapping:



Users must tap once on the unanswered (white) box, then quickly tap twice on the answered (blue) box. This will turn both boxes white and the question will disappear.

There patient facing questions end with "Have you ever had military service?" but we have maintained the following questions for our tracking purposes:

This section "talks to" the same data in the QuickView and the patient banner. That is, updating information in any of these locations, updates information in all three.
